Students must be enrolled in the Bachelor of Health Science or the Bachelor of Public Health Program

Course Overview

The purpose of this course is to provide students the opportunity to learn multiple ways to view current controversial topics in public health. The course covers current public health topics encompassing biomedical issues, social and behavioral factors related to health, and the environment.

Course Objectives and/or Goals

During this class, students will:

- Compare and contrast the most current complex public health issues and challenges in society
- Analyze peer-reviewed publications addressing controversial public health issues
- Integrate, compare, and articulate multiple perspectives of public health issues from both a proponent view and an oppositional view.
- Comprehend the influence of personal bias on how public health issues are presented.

- Synthesizing and discussing multiple viewpoints of the assigned public health issue based on current evidence and societal trends.

Blended Learning

What is blended learning and why is it important?

A Blended Learning class uses a mixture of technology and face-to-face instruction to help you maximize your learning. Knowledge content that, as the instructor, I would have traditionally presented during a live class lecture is instead provided online before the live class takes place. This lets me focus my face-to-face teaching on course activities designed to help you strengthen higher order thinking skills such as critical thinking, problem solving, and collaboration. Competency in these skills is critical for today's health professional.

What is expected of you?

You are expected to actively engage in the course throughout the semester. You must come to class prepared by completing all out-of-class assignments. This preparation gives you the knowledge or practice needed to engage in higher levels of learning during the live class sessions. If you are not prepared for the face-to-face sessions, you may struggle to keep pace with the activities occurring in the live sessions, and it is unlikely that you will reach the higher learning goals of the course. Similarly, you are expected to actively participate in the live class. Your participation fosters a rich course experience for you and your peers that facilitates overall mastery of the course objectives.

Required Textbook

There is an online text for this class through Top Hat. Additionally, you will be using the website ProCon.org to complete reading assignments. ProCon.org is an independent, nonpartisan, nonprofit organization. The purpose of this website is to provide resources for critical thinking and to educate without bias. It promotes informed citizenship by presenting research on controversial issues in a straightforward, nonpartisan format.

Kritik.io

We will be using Kritik.io, a peer-to-peer learning platform in this course. It is an engaging and gamified web technology that helps you develop your higher-order-thinking skills (HOTS) according to Bloom's taxonomy of cognitive thinking. It also improves your soft skills in feedback communication.

An email invitation will be sent to your school email account that contains the link to register an account on Kritik and enrol in the course. Don't worry if you don't see any content in the course right away. I will make it available to you as we progress through the semester.

Please note that the app is currently accessible only in the browser. If you have any questions about Kritik, please contact their support team at support@kritik.io or use the live chat in the app. They usually respond promptly in a few hours. You can also visit Kritik Help Center at <https://www.kritik.io/student-user-guidance-page>, which outlines a brief overview to get you up and running on the system.

Each week, you will have the opportunity to debate the critical issue you from the perspective you were assigned. Following each class, I would like you to upload a one-paragraph summary of the opposing views based on what you have read and the class debate. This activity is for participation only and you will not be graded on the specific content. This is a peer review exercise and your fellow students will be evaluating your response as either acceptable or unacceptable based on the criteria below. Please note that each student will be responsible for evaluating two student summaries each week.

Instructional Methods

- 1. Quizzes:** Following each online lecture, students will complete a 5-question quiz through canvas (10 quizzes total). You will have **ONE** chance to take each quiz and the quizzes will be timed. Each quiz will be assigned 10 minutes. You must complete the quiz for your assigned module before coming to class.
- 2. Weekly Readings:** Each week you will have assigned readings directly related to the current Week's controversial public health topic. Details of the reading assignments will be provided through Canvas.
- 3. Group Participation/Discussion Activities:** We will meet one day per week as outlined below. Every Tuesday will involve a discussion of the controversial issues and the class will engage in a "reasoned discourse" (like a debate, but without the contentious connotations) about a controversial public health issue. You are responsible for reading the assigned material prior to the discussion. You will be assigned into one of eight groups. Each group will be assigned a position to argue: four groups on the pro side, four groups on the con side.

Full participation within these discussions will count towards your participation grade. Points will be deducted from your group participation grade for the following (but not limited to): not involved in the group discussion, performing activities other than the course discussion such as texting, studying for other exams, etc., frequent absences, and unprofessional behavior. Additional points will be based on your participation on Top Hat and Kritik course activities.

4. **Exams:** There will be two exams in the course. Each exam will consist of up to 50 questions (short answer and multiple choice). The exams will not be cumulative and will cover the main ideas from the reading as well information communicated during class discussions. Please note all exams will be taken during class using Canvas. This means that you must bring a device that will allow you to take the exam.

Lock down browser- You are required to download the lock down browser for your exams. This has to be done BEFORE exam 1. If you do not have this set up on your device, you will not be permitted to take the exam until you have the browser set up. The details for the lock down browser are on Canvas.

A note about make-up exams: Make-up examinations are not normally given in this course. The only circumstances in which a makeup exam will be given are:

1. An official, University sponsored event requires you to be off campus during the exam
2. A medical emergency prevents you from attending class
3. A family emergency prevents you from attending class
4. Jury duty
5. Military service, a religious observance, or a similar obligation prevents you from attending class.

If you miss an examination for any reason, you must contact us before the exam and you must provide written documentation of the event in order to schedule a make-up exam.

5. **Main Points Paper:** Students will be required to complete two main points paper for selected issues by reading about the topics on ProCon.org, Top Hat materials, and other available evidence. The goal of this assignment is for students to review important points relevant to both sides of the issue. You must state and analyze the main points of each section on ProCon.org: Background, Pro and Con (See rubric in canvas). Assignments to be submitted through Canvas prior to the topic being discussed in class. For example, if you picked the topic Vaccines for paper 1, your Paper will be due on 8/27/2019 @ 8:30 am given that Vaccines is taught on 8/27/2019. Five points will be deducted for each day the assignment is late (no exceptions). This allows you plenty of time to write your paper and also ask questions.

You will use the groups tab in canvas to choose your topic. You are allowed to pick only one topic in each group set and are required to participate in BOTH the group sets. Please contact the TA or the instructor should you have questions or concerns.

Your topic selections must be completed on or before 9/10/2018 @ 8 am. Failure to do so will result in reduction of possible points from your assigned paper grades.

7. **Attendance/Tardiness:** Class is considered an appointment. Students taking an advanced course in helping professions and public health are expected to keep appointments and arrive on time and remain for the entire class period. There will be attendance checks for each of the 11 topics discussed in class (5 points each). Attendance will be taken and recorded in Top Hat.

Faculty have received feedback from students and other colleagues regarding frequently arriving to class late. When a student enters the classroom late it is disruptive to the entire class. Class is considered an appointment. Students taking an advanced level course in a helping profession are expected to arrive to appointments on time and prepared to learn. Tardiness is not acceptable in public health and helping professions, and will not be tolerated in the classroom. If you are more than five minutes late three times, you will lose an attendance check worth five points.

We do realize that students may have a class directly before this course at a distant location, making it difficult to arrive to class on time. Students in this situation must provide written documentation to the instructors no later than the second week of class.
